## Keynote Speaker

### David Satcher, M.D., Ph.D.

Dr. David Satcher was the 16th Surgeon General of the United States from 1998 to 2002. He served simultaneously in the positions of Surgeon General and assistant secretary for Health from February 1998 through January 2001. He also held the posts of director of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and administrator of the Agency for Toxic Substances and Disease Registry from 1993 to 1998.



As Surgeon General and assistant secretary for Health, Dr. Satcher led the Department of Health and Human Services' effort to eliminate racial and ethnic disparities in health, an initiative that was incorporated as one of the two major goals of Healthy People 2010, the nation's health agenda for the new millennium. He also released Surgeon General's reports on tobacco and health and on mental health, which were followed by supplements on children's mental health, health disparities, mental retardation, culture, race and ethnicity, and suicide prevention. These helped spur a national strategy to prevent suicide; promote oral health, sexual health, and responsible sexual behavior; prevent youth violence; and control obesity.

Before becoming the 16th Surgeon General of the United States, he was president of Meharry Medical College in Nashville, Tennessee, from 1982 to 1993.

Upon his departure from the post of Surgeon General, Dr. Satcher became a fellow at the Kaiser Family Foundation. In fall of 2002, he assumed the post of director of the National Center for Primary Care at the Morehouse School of Medicine.

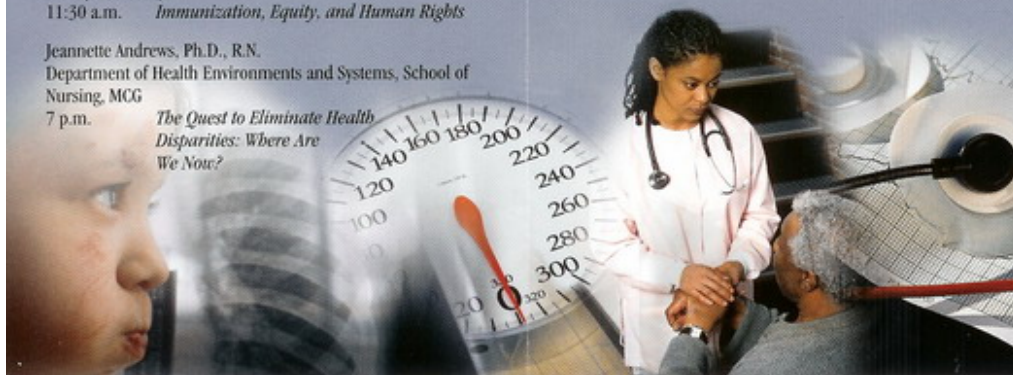
